

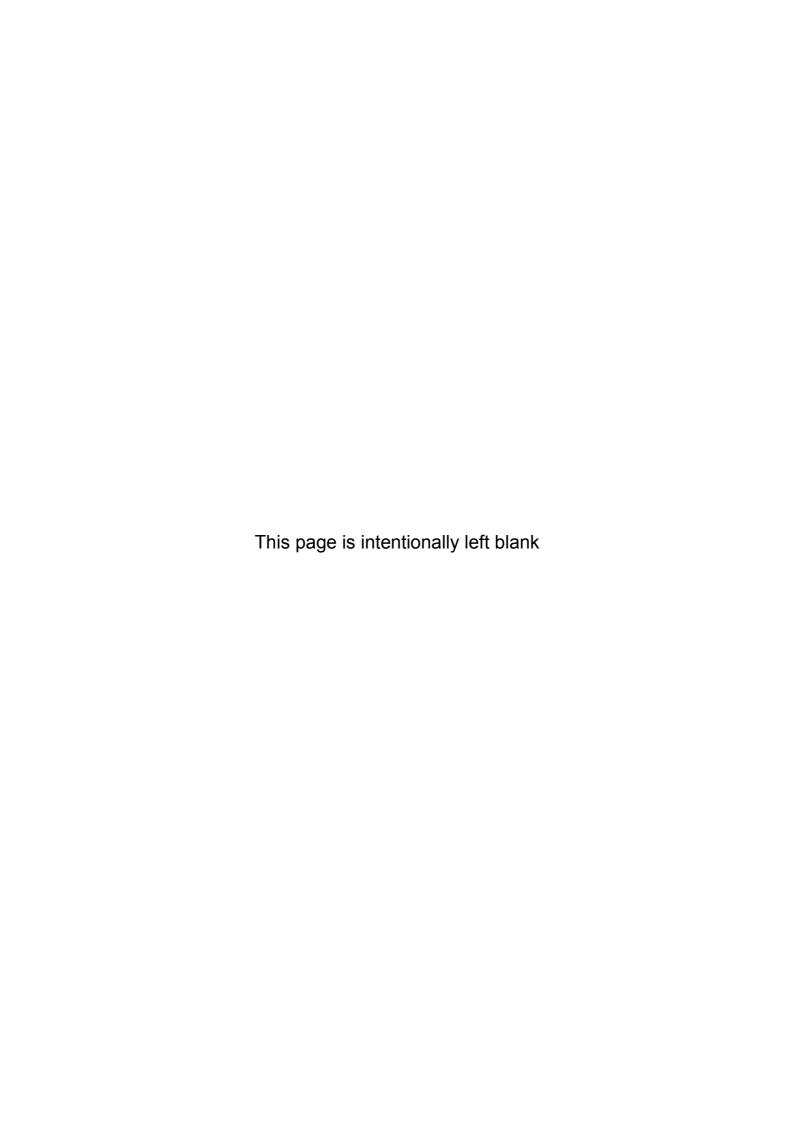

GENERAL PROCEDURE POINTS FOR HEARINGS

INTRODUCTION

The Licensing Act 2003 Sub-Committee will conduct hearings in accordance with the following general principles:

- All parties have a right to a fair hearing.
- Decision-making will be conducted in an open, transparent and accountable way.
- Each application will be determined on its own merits and the decision will be based upon:
 - the merits of the application
 - the promotion of the four licensing objectives
 - the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy
 - the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003
- the Licensing Authority will only permit licensing decisions to be taken by sub-committee consisting of three members. In the event of one member being unable to attend, the Licensing authority will use it's best endeavours to substitute another member, taken from the membership of the Licensing Act 2003 Sub-Committee reserve list.
- the Sub-Committee may disallow cross-examination in exceptional circumstances; this decision will be taken on a case by case basis with a presumption to allow. However, parties are advised that the Sub-Committee wishes to discourage hostile cross examination.
- late representations and evidence will usually only be considered with the agreement of all parties present.
- decisions will generally be taken regardless of whether the applicant/other party is present unless the Sub-Committee consider it necessary in the public interest to adjourn the hearing to a specified date. All notices and representations from absent parties will be considered.
- the Sub-Committee will generally allow parties a maximum of 30 minutes per party to make all relevant Statements. However, the Sub-Committee recognises that in certain circumstances this may be insufficient due to the complexity of the issues involved. In this situation the Sub-Committee will consider representations from those parties involved in the hearing as to the length required to make all relevant statements. The Licensing Authority respectfully requests that all parties keep points pertinent and the discussion moving in the interests of cost and efficiency.

- the Sub-Committee recognises that Regulation 14 requires all hearings should take place in public unless the licensing authority "considers that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing taking place in public" in which the applicant, those assisting the applicant or other interested parties can be excluded. In the absence of any criteria in the Licensing Act 2003, the guidance issued under section 182 of the Act or the licensing Regulations, the Licensing Authority has adopted the existing criteria in Schedule 12A of the Local Government Act 1972 for excluding the press and public. The public and press will be excluded when the Sub-Committee is considering an application for a personal licence, where Lancashire Police have lodged an objection notice due to an existing relevant offence(s). Generally, the public and the applicant will be excluded when the Sub-Committee is determining a decision. Once a decision has been made all parties will be readmitted and the Chair will announce the decision and give reasons.
- all parties will be notified of the decision in accordance with any periods set down by the Licensing Act 2003 or where none are prescribed within 5 working days.
- the Sub-Committee has the right to exclude any parties behaving in a disruptive manner at the hearing at its own discretion.

APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF A LICENCE IN RESPECT OF T & S CONVENIENCE STORE 76 – 78 MARKET STREET **CHORLEY PR7 2SS MADE UNDER SECTION 52 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003**

PURPOSE OF REPORT

1. To enable Members to determine an application for a review of a licence in respect of the premises known as T & S Convenience Store 76 – 78 Market Street Chorley PR7 2SS.

RECOMMENDATION(S)

Members are asked to consider the details contained in the report and any representations 2. made by the applicant and/or his representative Lancashire Constabulary and Lancashire County Council Trading Standards Service.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF REPORT

- 3. The Licensing Authority has received an application served under the Licensing Act 2003 Section 51 by Lancashire Constabulary and Lancashire Trading Standards to review the premises licence for T & S Convenience Store 76 – 78 Market Street Chorley PR7 2SS. The hearing is convened under Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 4. In accordance with section 51(3) of the Act, the relevant notices detailing the aforementioned grounds for review were displayed on the premises giving interested parties the right to make representations regarding the application for review and be available to view in full at the Council Offices. The premises licence holder has also received a copy of the review application.

BACKGROUND

- 8. On 11th August 2011 an application for a review of the premises licence was received from Lancashire Constabulary and Lancashire Trading Standards acting as responsible authorities.
- 9. A brief outline of the grounds for the review are as follows and made under the headings of 'The prevention of Crime and Disorder' and 'The Protection of Children From Harm'.
- 10. The grounds for the review are that the premises have failed a Trading Standards purchase where a member of staff sold alcohol to a person under 18. Further investigation by the Police and Trading Standards officers into why the sale took place showed that the member of staff had not received the required training and that the premises had therefore breached a number of conditions on its licence. The conditions that had been breached were imposed as a result of a review hearing to try and prevent test purchase failures. It is clear to both the Police and Trading Standards officers that despite having given the premises the opportunity of improving its operation the premises licence holder and DPS have failed in this regard and as such both the Police and Trading Standards feel that revocation of the licence is now the only option. A copy of the requests for a review of the premises licence is attached to this report at Appendix (A)
- 11. Lancashire Constabulary submitted additional documentation with the request for a review of the premises licence, those documents are:- A copy of the consent order at Appendix (B) A copy of the refusal register at Appendix (C) DVD footage from the premises at Appendix (D) A document outlining CCTV comparisons and a copy of the refusal register showing relevant entries at Appendix (E) A document outlining premises licence breaches at Appendix (F)
- 12. Lancashire Trading Standards Service have submitted documents in support of the request for a review of the premises licence those documents are A witness statement from Carol Ann Cartwright, a Trading Standards officer at Appendix (G) A record of a taped interview of Tahir Badat at Appendix (H)
- 13. The premises licence holder is Mehboob Patel and Suhail Patel. A copy of the premises licence is attached at Appendix (I)
- 14. Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 provides that a Licensing Authority must have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy and the guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Act.
- 15. As Members will be aware the four licensing objectives are as follows
 - a. The prevention of crime and disorder
 - b. Public safety
 - c. Prevention of public nuisance
 - d. The protection of children from harm.
- 16. Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003 provides that where relevant representations are received the Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to consider them.

- 17. The Licensing Authority in determining the application, having had regard to the representations and Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003 may take the following steps it considers is necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
 - i) To modify the conditions of the licence
 - ii) To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence
 - iii) To remove the designated premises supervisor
 - iv) To suspend the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months
 - v) Revoke the licence
- 18. Members must have regard to the Statement of Licensing Policy when determining this application. In particular, member's attention is drawn to the following paragraphs:
- 19. **Paragraph 1.3** The policy provides guidance on the general approach the Council, as Licensing Authority, within the meaning of the Act, will take in terms of licensing. However, each application will be considered separately, on its individual merits.
- 20. Paragraph 1.4 The Statement of Licensing Policy sets out how the licensing objectives will be achieved and to secure the safety and amenity of residential communities whilst facilitating a sustainable entertainment and cultural industry. The Policy recognises both the needs of residents for a safe and healthy environment in which to live and work and the importance of safe and well run entertainment premises to the local economy. Balancing these interests will not always be straightforward and will be guided by the four licensing objectives.
- 21. Paragraph 2.5 Licensing law is not envisaged by the Licensing Authority as a mechanism to control anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are beyond the direct control of the licensee of any premises concerned. Therefore any terms and conditions imposed will be focused on matters within the control of individual Licensees and others granted relevant permissions. These matters will centre on the premises and places used for licensable activities and in the vicinity of the places.
- 22. **Paragraph 2.6** The Licensing Authority considers that every holder of a licence, certificate or permission and designated premises supervisor is responsible for minimising the impact of their activities and anti-social behaviour by their customers within the vicinity of their premises.

CRIME AND DISORDER

- 23. **Paragraph 6.1** Licensed premises, especially those offering late night entertainment, alcohol and refreshment can be a source of crime and disorder problems.
- 24. **Paragraph 6.4** The Council will have particular regard to the likely impact on licensing of related crime and disorder in the Borough particularly when considering the location, impact and the operation and management of all proposed licensed premises and applications for variations.
- 25. **Paragraph 6.5** The promotion of the crime and disorder-licensing objective, places a responsibility on licence holders to try and achieve this objective. Applicants will therefore be required to address, in their operating schedules, where appropriate, those measures that have been identified and will be implemented and/ or maintained to reduce or prevent crime and disorder in the vicinity of their premises. The Licensing Authority considers that best practice will be exemplified by the night safe initiative and would recommend that licence holders join this initiative.

REVIEWS

- 26. **Paragraph 41.1** The Act 2003 makes provision for the review of premises licences where problems associated with crime and disorder, public safety, public nuisance or the protection of children from harm are occurring.
- 27. **Paragraph 41.2** At any stage following the grant of a premises licence, a responsible authority or an interested party (such as a resident living in the vicinity of the premises), may request the Licensing Authority review the licence because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four licensing objectives.
- 28. **Paragraph 41.1** The Licensing Authority recognises that the promotion of the licensing objectives relies heavily on a partnership approach. The Licensing Authority would encourage authorised persons and responsible authorities to give licence holders warning of their concerns about problems identified at premises and of the need for improvement.
- 29. The Licensing Authority advises licence holders that a failure to respond to such a warning may lead to a responsible authority to request a review.
- 30. **Paragraph 41.11** The Licensing Authority will hold a hearing following a request for a review from a responsible authority, interested party or after closure procedures described earlier.
- 31. The Licensing Authority will make the licence holder fully aware of the representations received together with supporting evidence in order for the licence holder or his legal representatives to be able to prepare a response.
- 32. **Paragraph 41.12** In determining a review, the Licensing Authority has a range of powers it may exercise where it considers them necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - no action necessary as no steps required to promote the licensing objectives;
 - issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement
 within a particular period of time; The Licensing Authority regards such warnings as
 important mechanisms for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively
 promoted and any warning issued will be in writing to the licence holder.
 - to modify the conditions of the premises licence (including adding new conditions, altering/omitting an existing condition);
 - excluding a licensable activity from the licence;
 - remove the designated premises supervisor,
 - suspend the licence for a period of three months;
 - to revoke the licence.
- 33. **Paragraph 41.13** The Licensing Authority in determining what action to take will seek to establish the cause(s) of concern and any action taken will be directed at these causes. Any action taken to promote the licensing objectives will be necessary and proportionate.

HUMAN RIGHTS ACT IMPLICATIONS

34. The Human Rights Act 1998 makes it unlawful for a Local Authority to act in a way that is incompatible with the European Convention on Human Rights. The Council will have particular regard to the following convention Rights:

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- Article 6 that in the determination of civil rights and obligations everyone is entitled to a fair public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law;
- Article 8 that everyone has the right to respect for his home and family life;
- Article 1 of the First Protocol that every person is entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of his/her possessions including for example, possession of a licence.

There is a right of appeal to the Magistrates Court within 21 days from the date of receipt of the notification of the decision.

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Please provide as much information as possible to support the application (please read guidance note 2)

On 26th August 2010 the Police submitted an application for a review of the premises licence. The review arose as a result of a number of failed test purchase operations and the sale of alcohol from the premises which was leading to anti social behaviour in Chorley Town Centre. This review was supported by Lancashire Trading Standards and was heard by the Licensing Committee on 20th October 2010, where after hearing evidence from all parties the committee revoked the premises licence.

The Premises licence holder subsequently submitted an appeal application to Chorley Magistrates against the revocation of the licence. The appeal hearing was listed for hearing on 16th March 2011. In the meantime the premises was able to continue trading.

A case management hearing was held at Chorley Magistrates Court on 10th January 2011, where the applicant attended with their legal representation instructed by "Licensing Matters" Consultancy.

It transpired that "Licensing Matters" were now working with the premises providing a compehensive training package, instruction and documentation in order to prevent any further underage sales. After some debate between the legal representatives from the Council, those representing the premises and the police it was felt that the appeal could be resolved by the imposition of conditions on the licence. This decision was not taken lightly but heavily influenced by the fact that "Licensing Matters" would be involved.

The police then drew up a list of conditions that were to be under-pinned by the training provided by "Licensing Matters" and these were agreed with the Premises Licence Holder.

At the appeal hearing a consent order, drawn up by the premises, was presented to the Magistrates containing the list of conditions with the request that they be imposed onto the licence. The order was signed by all parties to the appeal and a copy is attached to this review at No 1.

Although the consent order was agreed and would effectively come into force at that time the premises had apparently been let down by the CCTV engineer in installing the audio equipment. The premises stated it would be done, so an agreement was made that the consent order would be suspended for 10 working days to allow the system to be upgraded to the required standard.

At 11.50 hrs on Tuesday 29th March 2011 police, in company with council officers, attended the premises to check the CCTV system was operating as per the licence condition. Tariq Patel, the son of the DPS and the person responsible for previous test purchase failures, was in the shop and demonstrated the system which appeared to be operating to the satisfaction of the police.

Tariq was spoken to and informed that the conditions in the consent order were now in force. It was reiterated to him that there was now a need to move forward and ensure that he and his staff were robust in challenging persons who appeared underage. Tariq stated that he would be a lot stricter where this was concerned.

On the evening of Friday 27th May 2011, Trading Standards Officers conducted a test purchase operation in Chorley. It was decided that one of the target premises should be T & S Convenience Store as this was the first opportunity, since the appeal, to test whether the new procedures were working.

About 7pm that night a 15 year old male was sent into the premises, whilst in there he was sold a bottle of wine by the member of staff working behind the till. At no time was the male challenged about his age or asked for any identification. This was the only sale made to this volunteer that evening despite having visited a number of other licensed premises.

The details of the staff member Tahir Badat were obtained after the sale and a few days later CCTV footage of the sale was seized from the premises. It was also discovered that the staff member who had made the sale had now been sacked.

Arrangements were made between the Police and Trading Standards to interview the seller, however it was felt that the reason for the failure needed to be established. The main question being whether or not the staff member had been trained as specified in the conditions of the licence.

At 14.45 hours on Monday 11th July 2011, Police, Trading Standards and Council officers attended the premises where they spoke with both Mehboob Patel and Tariq Patel. They were asked if there were any training records for the staff member they both said there wasn't any.

Both were then cautioned and it was explained that if there were no training records then they would be committing offences under the licensing act as they were failing to comply with the conditions on their licence.

After caution it was then confirmed that no training had taken place and therefore no records existed, Mehboob stated that they did not do any staff training until they were permanent members of staff and Tariq confirmed the male had only worked there for 3 weeks, again confirming that no training had been provided.

It was pointed out that they were in breach of the conditions on the licence, details were also obtained of another member of staff working in the shop at the time this visit was taking place.

It was further confirmed that this member of staff had not received any training and in fact there were no records of any training provided for any members of staff.

A check was then made of the refusal/incident book at the premises to ensure that this was being completed in accordance with the licence condition.

Upon examining the book, which had clearly been provided by "Licensing Matters" it showed that the first entry was made on 18th Februray 2011, there were 32 entries untill 27th March . A further 2 entries on 11th and 13th May , 2 entries on 3rd and 6th June and then entries on 1st, 4th, 6th and 8th May. The entries in the book were not comprehensive nor did they comply with the example entry in the front. It was in fact suspected that some of the entries were being made by a member of staff behind the counter whilst officers were in the storeroom.

Tariq was then asked to show the CCTV footage corresponding to a number of entries in the book, 4 separate entries were checked all of which seemed to indicate that the entries were not true accounts of challenges made.

It was clear that the refusal book was not completed to the satisfaction of the Police so it was seized as evidence and a copy is attached to this review at No 2.

Due to this a request was made to provide the police with footage corresponding to all the challenges made during July. After a number of requests for the footage it was

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eventually supplied on 21st July. A copy of this footage on DVD is attached to this review at No 3.

This footage has been checked against the entries in the refusal register and there have been a number of descrepancies highlighted. These have been documented and a copy is attached to this review at no 4.

Mehboob and Tariq were asked to identify some of the signatures against entries in the refusal book and it was quite apparent they were unable to do so.

IAt 09:00 hrs Monday 18th July Police and Trading Standards conducted a tape recorded PACE interview with Badat. Whilst under caution Badat admitted selling the alcohol to the male and accepted that the male was underage. He was asked if he had been given any training. He stated that Mehboob Patel had explained to him the procedures for using the till and other aspects in running the store. There was mention of checking the age of persons buying alcohol and that he was given a book which explained about underage sales. Badat confirmed that he had not been given any formal training by anyone at the shop and admitted he had only briefly looked at the book. He further stated that he had never had his knowledge of the book tested nor had he signed any training documents. Badat did confirm that Mehboob Patel said he would put him on the course after a number of weeks if he was still at the store.

As a result of all the above information arrangements have been made to interview Mehboob Patel under caution with a view to instigating criminal proceedings under the Licensing Act 2003.

It is clear that there have been breaches of the conditions attached to the premises licence despite assurances given at the appeal hearing that they would make vast improvements to their operation.

A document outlining the breaches in detail is attached to this review at No 5.

The Police and Trading Standards now believe that having been given a second chance Mehboob Patel has demonstrated his inability to run a licensed premises, despite comprehensive guidance from licensing professionals and therefore they request that the premises licence be revoked.

Re: Application to review premises licence of T & S Convenience Store (Best One) 76-78 Market Street Chorley PR7 2SS (Mr Mehboob Patel/Mr Suhail Patel).

I am writing with reference to the above premises and with specific reference to a joint application to review the premise license submitted by Sergeant 1506 Anthony Bushell on behalf of Lancashire Constabulary. The substance of this letter is to confirm full and unequivocal support for the submission to revoke the premises licence for the following reasons by way of background:-

- On 5 June 2010 a Trading Standards test purchase operation was conducted in the Borough of Chorley. T&S Convenience Store (Best One) located at 76-78 Market Street Chorley was targeted for a test purchase visit.
- A 14 year old girl volunteer was instructed to attempt to purchase tobacco. She was instructed to answer truthfully if challenged as to her age or whether she could provide acceptable proof of age.
- A sale of a packet of 10 Lambert and Butler Kingsize Cigarettes was made. At no point
 was the female volunteer asked her age nor was she asked to provide proof of age.
- Subsequent investigation revealed that the seller Tariq Patel is the son of Mehboob Patel
 the Designated Premises Supervisor for the premises at the time of the sale.
- During the course of the investigation it transpires that the premises purport to operate a 25 policy for the sale of tobacco i.e. seeking proof of age from customers who do not look over 25.
- The refusals register was examined which revealed that there were no entries in it from the seller, Tariq Patel.
- There was no documentary evidence to demonstrate whether Tariq Patel had received training in the prevention of underage sales, although Mr Patel claimed that he had been trained by his brother and Premise Licence Holder Suhail Patel.
- The matter was reported and Mehboob Patel and Tariq Patel were instructed to attend the Trading Standards Age Restricted Products Course on 29 November 2010.
- Both Mehboob Patel and Tariq Patel failed to attend the course on 29 November 2010.

On 26 August 2010 the Police submitted an application for a review of the premises license which was supported by this Service, the outcome being that the Licensing Committee revoked the premises licence. The premise Licence holder subsequently submitted an appeal and during the case management hearing a list of additional conditions were agreed as listed in the consent order, including:-





- 9) All staff, on starting employment with the premises, will receive training with regards the sales of age restricted products, the training package of which will be to the satisfaction of the Police and Local Authority.
- 11) All training will be recorded and copies retained at the premises for a period of 12 months. The records will be made available for inspection by any responsible authority on reasonable request.
- 13) The premises will operate a refusals register in relation to age restricted products which will be maintained to the satisfaction of Lancashire Constabulary and will be provided to any responsible authority on reasonable request.
 - On Friday 27 May 2011 a test purchase operation was conducted in company with Council Officers from Chorley Borough Council.
 - At 18.58 hours a 15 year old male child volunteer was instructed to attempt to purchase alcohol from the premises.
 - He had been instructed to state his true age if challenged and to state that he had no proof of age if asked.
 - A sale of a bottle of white wine was made by a staff member named Tahir Badat. The sale was made without any challenge to the child volunteer. Personal details of Tahir Badat were recorded at the time who was subsequently dismissed from employment after the sale.
 - On Monday 11 July 2011 at 14.45 hours in company with Police and Council Officers the premises were visited to ascertain the reason for the failed test purchase.
 - Mehboob Patel and Tariq Patel were asked to produce the training records for Tahir Badat to which they stated that there were none. After a caution was issued by the Police, they again confirmed that there were no training records for Tahir Badat.
 - A check was subsequently conducted on 4 refusals book entries for the premises against CCTV footage which indicated that the entries were not true accounts of what had taken place and the Police requested that CCTV footage be provided in relation to the challenges and entries made in the book during the month of July for further scrutiny.
 - On 18 July 2011 a tape recorded interview under PACE was conducted with Mr Tahir Badat in company with the Police for the sale conducted on 27 May 2011. Under caution Tahir Badat admitted that he had conducted the sale and stated that he had been given a book to read regarding underage sales upon commencement of employment but no formal training had taken place. He further admitted under caution that he did not read the book "that often". He stated that had he been placed on a formal training course on the outset then the sale would not have taken place.

We share Police concerns regarding the ability and willingness for the premise to comply with their legal duty in not selling age restricted products to young people who have not attained the specified age and adhering to the 4th licensing objective, the protection of children from harm.

This letter and the content therein are in full endorsement of the submission by Lancashire Constabulary jointly with this Service to revoke the premise licence for the reasons previously stated.

- 7. The 'Challenge 21' Scheme will be implemented at the premises at all times. Any person who does not appear to be at least 21 years of age, will not be served unless they can produce a recognised proof of age card accredited under the Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS), current photo-card driving licence or current passport.
- 8. Notices will be displayed where they can be clearly seen and read in the premises indicating that the premises operates the 'Challenge 21' scheme is in operation at the premises.
- 9. All staff, on starting employment with the premises, will receive training with regards the sales of age restricted products, the training package of which will be to the satisfaction of the Police and Local Authority.
- 10. All staff will receive underage sales refresher training at intervals of not less than every 4 months.
- 11. All training will be recorded and copies retained at the premises for a periods of 12 months. The records will be made available for inspection by any responsible authority on reasonable request.
- 12. All the tills used at the premises will have an Electronic Point of Sale (EPOS) system which will provide prompts re age restricted products.
- 13. The premises will operate a refusal register in relation to age restricted products which will be maintained to the satisfaction of Lancashire Constabulary and will be provided to any responsible authority on reasonable request.


