GENERAL PROCEDURE POINTS FOR HEARINGS

INTRODUCTION

The Licensing Act 2003 Sub-Committee will conduct hearings in accordance with the following general principles:

- All parties have a right to a fair hearing.
- Decision-making will be conducted in an open, transparent and accountable way.
- Each application will be determined on its own merits and the decision will be based upon:
 - the merits of the application
 - the promotion of the four licensing objectives
 - the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy
 - the Guidance issued by the Home Office under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003
- the Licensing Authority will only permit licensing decisions to be taken by sub-committee consisting of three members. In the event of one member being unable to attend, the Licensing authority will use its best endeavours to substitute another member, taken from the membership of the Licensing Act 2003 Sub-Committee reserve list.
- the Sub-Committee may disallow cross-examination in exceptional circumstances; this decision will be taken on a case by case basis with a presumption to allow. However, parties are advised that the Sub-Committee wishes to discourage hostile cross examination.
- late representations and evidence will usually only be considered with the agreement of all parties present.
- decisions will generally be taken regardless of whether the applicant/other party is present unless the Sub-Committee consider it necessary in the public interest to adjourn the hearing to a specified date. All notices and representations from absent parties will be considered.
- the Sub-Committee will generally allow parties a maximum of 30 minutes per party to make all relevant statements. However, the Sub-Committee recognises that in certain circumstances this may be insufficient due to the complexity of the issues involved. In this situation the Sub-Committee will consider representations from those parties involved in the hearing as to the length required to make all relevant statements. The Licensing Authority respectfully requests that all parties keep points pertinent and the discussion moving in the interests of cost and efficiency.
- the Sub-Committee recognises that Regulation 14 requires all hearings should take place in public, but the Licensing Authority may exclude the public from all or part of a hearing where it

considers that the public interest in so doing outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing taking place in public. In the absence of any criteria in the Licensing Act 2003, the guidance issued under section 182 of the Act or the Licensing Hearings Regulations, the Licensing Authority has adopted the existing criteria in Schedule 12A of the Local Government Act 1972 for excluding the press and public. The public and press will be excluded when the Sub-Committee is considering an application for a personal licence, where Lancashire Police have lodged an objection notice due to an existing relevant offence(s). Generally, the public and the applicant will be excluded when the Sub-Committee is determining a decision. Once a decision has been made all parties will be readmitted and the Chair will announce the decision and give reasons.

- all parties will be notified of the decision in accordance with any periods set down by the Licensing Act 2003 and Regulations made thereunder or where none are prescribed within 5 working days.
- the Sub-Committee has the right to exclude any parties behaving in a disruptive manner at the hearing at its own discretion.

REASON FOR REFERRAL

- 1. To advise members of an application to vary a premises licence under Section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003, to which relevant representations have been received.
- 2. To request that members determine the application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003.

LICENSING OBJECTIVES

- 4. Members are reminded of the Licensing Objectives, as follows:
 - Prevention of Crime and Disorder
 - Public Safety
 - Prevention of Public Nuisance
 - Protection of Children from Harm
- 5. Members are reminded that the duty of the licensing authority is to take steps necessary to promote the licensing objectives in the interests of the wider community and not those of the individual licence holder.

APPEALS

6. An appeal against the decision of the Council may be made to the Magistrates' Court within 21 days of receipt of the determination notice which will be delivered to all relevant parties.

LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

- 7. Members must have regard to the following:
 - The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. In particular, Sections 9.12, 9.30-9.44 may aid members in their decision.
 - The Council's Statement of Licensing Policy effective from 2016.
 - The Licensing Act 2003.

CURRENT PREMISES LICENCE

- The premises has benefitted from a premises licence since its conversion from a Justices 8. On-Licence in 2005. A copy of the most recent premises licence is appended at Appendix 1. Members will note that there are a number of activities which are authorised by this licence and a summary is provided in the table at paragraph 13 of this report.
- 9. For each activity, non-standard timings provide that the terminal hour for that activity shall be equal to that of Saturday on Bank Holiday Sundays, Christmas Eve, Boxing Day, New Year's Eve.
- 10. At Annex 2 of the premises licence, members will note the current conditions of the licence.

PROPOSED VARIATION

- 11. On 07.02.19, an application to vary the premises licence was received. This application is appended at Appendix 2. This application seeks to delete the current operating schedule and replace it with an updated version.
- 12. It further seeks to make changes to permitted hours for licensable activities, as summarised below:

14. It seeks to amend the non- standard timings for all activities (excluding Late Night Refreshment) to allow the permitted hours on the days preceding bank holidays, Boxing Day and New Year's day to be as those for Saturday hours.

REPRESENTATIONS

- 15. During the statutory consultation period, the applicant and Lancashire Constabulary held a meeting and agreed the following conditions, in addition to those offered in the operating schedule:
 - 1. On each occasion that the premises opens there shall be two SIA registered door supervisors on duty from 22:00 hrs. Provision of SIA registered door supervisors in addition to this shall be at the discretion of the DPS or manager on the night based on a dynamic risk assessment on numbers expected and numbers in attendance.
 - Door supervisors shall be required to wear an identifiable arm band whilst on а. duty)
 - 2. No person aged under 18 yrs shall be permitted in the premises after 22:30 hrs.

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- 3. A written drugs policy shall be in place covering
 - a. searches, seizure, recording and secure storage of suspected drugs
 - b. procedures in respect of informing police of any seizures considered of significant size
 - c. procedures in relation to any seizures requiring collection and disposal by police.
- 4. A written dispersal policy shall be in place setting out plans for an orderly dispersal of customers.
- 5. There shall be no entry to the venue for the last 30 minutes of opening.
- 6. There shall be a qualified first aider on site during all times when the premises are open to the public.
- 7. There shall be a method in place to accurately monitor and record the number of customers in the premises when it is open to the public
- 16. Members may wish to consider whether it is appropriate to impose the measures provided at paragraph 15.
- 17. On 07.03.19, a representation was received from the Chief Officer of Police, acting in the capacity as a Responsible Authority, as to the likely effect on the licensing objectives in the event the variation was granted. A copy of this representation is appended as <u>Appendix 3</u>.
- 18. In accordance with Regulation 6 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations,, the Chief Officer of Police has been asked to provide clarification on the following particular points:
 - The measures which, in the view of the RA, would be appropriate to promote the objectives.
 - Further information in respect of the incidents referred to in the representation and, specifically, how these incidents are tied to the premises and the carrying on of licensable activity at the premises.

The licence holder and the police have a right of appeal against the decision of the licensing authority to the local magistrates' court within 21 days of notice of the decision.

The duty of the sub-committee to have regard to any relevant representations, national guidance issued by the Home Office under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and also to the Council's adopted licensing policy is referred to in the body of the report.

Aspects of the Human Rights Act 1998 are engaged, namely the right to a fair trial and the protection of property.

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CONCLUSIONS

- 22. The decision should be based on the individual merits of the application and the representation. In accordance with Regulation 26(2) of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, a decision must be made within the period of 5 working days beginning with the day or the last day on which the hearing was held.
- 23. In accordance with Section 35, the Authority must, having regard to the representation made, take such steps mentioned below (if any) as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - Modify the conditions of the licence •
 - To reject the whole or part of the application. •
- In rejecting the whole or part of the application, members are permitted to reduce the 24. permitted hours for an activity. Members are not permitted to reduce hours further than are currently authorised by the licence.

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner

DISPENSING ALCOHOL

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

FREE TAP WATER

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

AGE VERIFICATION

(1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

(3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either;

(a) a holographic mark, or .

(b) an ultraviolet feature.

ALCOHOL MEASURES

The responsible person shall ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-

- (i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and

(b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.



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EXHIBITION OF FILMS

1a) The Premises licence holder shall ensure that the admission of children to the exhibition of any film shall be restricted in accordance with section 20 of the Licensing Act 2003(the Act) 1b) Unless section 20(3) (b) of the Act applies, admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the film classification board specified in this licence 1c) Where section 20(3) (b) of the Act applies, admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the licensing authority 1d) Where no film classification board is specified in this licence admission of children to the exhibition of any film shall be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the licensing authority. 1e) For the purposes of this condition:-"children" means persons aged under 18; and "film classification board" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification) DOOR SUPERVISORS The Premises licence holder shall ensure that each individual present on the premises to carry out a security activity [as defined by paragraph 2(1) (a) of the Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001] must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority. SCHEDULE Mandatory Licensing Condition MINIMUM DRINKS PRICING 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price. 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1-(a)"duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(a); . (b)"permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula $P = D + (D \times V)$ where-(i) P is the permitted price, (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol; (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence (i) the holder of the premises licence, (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence; (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and Printed on 15 March 2019 at 12:11 PM 19/00125/LAPLA www.chorley.gov.uk Page 5 of 10

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(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(b).

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

ANNEX 2 – CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

Note - Some conditions may apply to one or more of the objectives

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The DPS will continue the partnership of crime and disorder policy and will actively work with the police and local authority on any initiatives in this respect.

A policy of refusing to serve customers who appear to be inebriated will continue to be enforced.

The company will refuse to sell alcohol to any individual who appears to be intending to consume alcohol in a public area.

The company voluntarily agrees to display when reasonably required by the local authority crime prevention notices.

The company will only engage in drinks promotions where it is satisfied that such promotions do not conflict with the licensing objectives.

To ensure that members of the public and police officers on duty can be sure that alcohol is only being served in accordance with the authorised hours, signage will be implemented that will display the hours during which alcohol can be served.

Where the DPS or company's employees suspect that a criminal offence is being planned, committed or has been committed a report to the police will be made by telephone.

The company voluntarily subscribes to the Portman code of practice.

No drugs will be allowed on the premises and if a situation ever arises where the DPS or staff believe drugs are on the premises the police will be notified and the offender will be permanently barred from the premises.

Digital CCTV recording is in operation 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

All personnel have attended and new staff will be required to attend drugs awareness and conflict management courses.

A stop and search on entry policy is in force. All door staff carry interlinked radio earpieces for constant monitoring and emergency response.

The manager carries on his person radio connected to the towns CCTV system so any trouble in town can be noted. The manager is a member and regular attendee of Pubwatch and attends regularly the local authority's licensing liaison panel.

Public Safety

The DPS will fully co-operate with police where known criminals are concerned. The premises will not allow on to the premises any known offender or any person known to be barred from other licensed



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premises.

The DPS will ensure that a safe number of consumers are in the premises at any one time. A computer recorded door entry system ensures constant monitoring of people in the building so overcrowding cannot occur.

Means of escape are clearly displayed throughout the premises.

The Lancashire fire and rescue fire safety record book is available in the premises and all staff have a working knowledge of it and its advice forms part of this operating schedule. Where appropriate its advices are adopted in this schedule.

A general risk assessment will be conducted on not less than a 2 yearly basis.

Entrances, exits (including emergency exits) and aisles will be kept free from obstruction. A first aid kit will be kept on the premises and fully stocked. The contents of the first aid box will be reviewed regularly. No obvious fire risks will be maintained on the premises. Smoking in clearly monitored within the premises, ashtrays are supplied and emptied regularly. Highly flammable materials will not be allowed onto the premises.

Measures will be taken to ensure the safe evacuation of disabled persons in the event of an emergency evacuation.

Glass and spillages are cleared away immediately.

Coats are required to be kept in the cloakroom so that discarded clothing cannot present a hazard.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

Customers will be reminded by way of notices around the building that by way of courtesy to local residents is expected and anyone failing to obey this request will not be served alcohol in future and in appropriate cases will be barred from the premises.

Drunken or rowdy customers are not admitted to the premises and those that behave in this fashion are required to leave the premises.

Bottles and glasses cannot be removed from the premises.

Drinking of alcohol will not be permitted outside the premises.

Doors and windows will remain shut during any live performance that may take place and will cease at midnight at the latest.

Where further noise reduction is deemed necessary such will be implemented with consultation with the local authority.

Taxis are called to ensure people are taken away from the premises quickly and quietly at closing time.

Protection of Children From Harm

7. There shall be no admission of persons under 18 years of age whilst alcohol is being sold, is available to purchase, or consumed on the premise.

8. Children under the age of 16 years shall not be permitted access to cigarette machines.

9. Children under the age of 16 years shall be restricted to non-smoking areas of the premise.

Identify those conditions currently imposed on the licence which you believe could be removed as a consequence of the proposed variation you are seeking.

In order to tidy up the premises licence and bring it up to date the following conditions to be removed and replaced by volunteered conditions more in keeping with the current operation of the premises.

The DPS will continue the partnership of crime and disorder policy and will actively work with the police and local authority on any initiatives in this respect.

The company will refuse to sell alcohol to any individual who appears to be intending to consume alcohol in a public area.

To ensure that members of the public and police officers on duty can be sure that alcohol is only being served in accordance with the authorised hours, signage will be implemented that will display the hours during which alcohol can be served.

Where the DPS or company's employees suspect that a criminal offence is being planned, committed or has been committed a report to the police will be made by telephone.

The company voluntarily subscribes to the Portman code of practice.

No drugs will be allowed on the premises and if a situation ever arises where the DPS or staff believe drugs are on the premises the police will be notified and the offender will be permanently barred from the premises.

Digital CCTV recording is in operation 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

All personnel have attended and new staff will be required to attend drugs awareness and conflict management courses.

A stop and search on entry policy is in force. All door staff carry interlinked radio earpieces for constant monitoring and emergency response.

The manager carries on his person radio connected to the towns CCTV system so any trouble in town can be noted. The manager is a member and regular attendee of Pubwatch and attends regularly the local authority's licensing liaison panel.

The DPS will fully co-operate with police where known criminals are concerned. The premises will not allow on to the premises any known offender or any person known to be barred from other licensed premises.

The DPS will ensure that a safe number of consumers are in the premises at any one time. A computer recorded door entry system ensures constant monitoring of people in the building so overcrowding cannot occur.

The Lancashire fire and rescue fire safety record book is available in the premises and all staff have a working knowledge of it and its advice forms part of this operating schedule. Where appropriate its advices are adopted in this schedule.

No obvious fire risks will be maintained on the premises. Smoking in clearly monitored

within the premises, ashtrays are supplied and emptied regularly. Highly flammable materials will not be allowed onto the premises.

Measures will be taken to ensure the safe evacuation of disabled persons in the event of an emergency evacuation. Glass and spillages are cleared away immediately.

Coats are required to be kept in the cloakroom so that discarded clothing cannot present a hazard. further conditions in case notes

Customers will be reminded by way of notices around the building that by way of courtesy to local residents is expected and anyone failing to obey this request will not be served alcohol in future and in appropriate cases will be barred from the premises.

Drunken or rowdy customers are not admitted to the premises and those that behave in this fashion are required to leave the premises.

Bottles and glasses cannot be removed from the premises.

and will cease at midnight at the latest.

Where further noise reduction is deemed necessary such will be implemented with consultation with the local authority.

Taxis are called to ensure people are taken away from the premises quickly and quietly at closing time. 7. There shall be no admission of persons under 18 years of age whilst alcohol is being sold, is available

to purchase, or consumed on the premise.

8. Children under the age of 16 years shall not be permitted access to cigarette machines.

9 Children under the age of 16 years shall be restricted to non-smoking areas of the premise.

A documented challenge 25 scheme will be operated at the premises which will be actively promoted and advertised. Any person attempting to purchase alcohol who looks under 25 years of age will be asked to provide photographic identification to prove that they are 18 years of age or over. A documented training scheme shall be introduced for all staff in a position to sell alcohol. the date, time and reason for any refusal or any incidents of crime or disorder and will be available for inspection by any authorised officer on request.

APPLEJAX – Back Mount Street, Chorley

This representation is submitted after a lengthy consultation process involving face to face meeting with Applejax management and their consultant Mr. Cairney and a lengthy exchange of emails.

In considering a police response to parts of this application to vary closing times I have taken into account Chorley Council policy in relation to licensing objectives, in particular

5.1.4 The Licensing authority wishes to encourage applications for restaurants and other predominantly seated venues which do not adversely impact upon the licensing objectives in contrast to those that predominantly offer vertical drinking. If applications are made they must demonstrate how the licensing objectives are to be promoted.

Although this is not a new application it recognises that vertical drinking establishments are likely to have an adverse impact on the licensing objectives.

5.1.5 The current staggered closing times of licensed premises that has developed since 2005 in the Town Centre initially helped to reduce the problems associated with large numbers of people leaving premises at the same time but a significant number of premises within this area have now similar closing times which has increased the risk of increased levels of crime, disorder and nuisance.

Although this is around staggered closing times it references the problem of large numbers of people leaving a premises and in this case we are looking at the impact of large numbers of people leaving a single premises at 6am every Saturday and Sunday morning.

I have also taken into account the four Licensing Objectives as set out in Licensing Act 2003

- 1. The prevention of crime and disorder
- 2. Public safety
- 3. The prevention of public nuisance
- 4. The protection of children from harm.

There is currently no Cumulative Impact Policy for Chorley but the guidance is clear that this does not prevent a responsible authority from making representations on a variation on the grounds that the premises will give rise to a negative cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives.

I have also taken into account information held on police systems regarding AppleJax and the area immediately around it.

During this process there has been substantial compromise on both sides leading to a number of appropriate new and amended conditions being agreed and agreement to the removal of many obsolete conditions from the licence.

The only area where we have been unable to come to cone to a compromise agreement has been around hours. Applejax want to open until 6am on every Friday and Saturday throughout the year whilst Police have offered opening until 6am on up to 24 days based around public holidays and pay day weekends when there will likely be enhanced police presence in Chorley to deal with the additional crime and disorder that will inevitably flow from extending hours for a vertical drinking establishment from 4am to 6am.

During discussion Applejax raised the hours of the neighbouring premises The White Hart which I would submit is a pub rather than a club type premises, has more restrictive licensing conditions and should not be considered as a comparator for Applejax.

During discussion with Police, Applejax has also represented that they plan to use other bars in Chorley as feeder bars for Applejax and that opening Applejax until 6am would allow for a crowd to move through bars in the Chorley Night Time Economy with Applejax concentrating on being a final destination for a crowd that will arrive in drink in the early hours of the morning.

Whilst I recognise the desire of Applejax to be profitable and to have licence conditions that maximise their profitability, this cannot be at the expense of a negative impact on the licensing objectives. Nevertheless we have sought a compromise whereby the days supported by police and offered to Applejax were as follows

New Years Day Good Friday Saturday before Easter Monday Saturday before MayDay Saturday before Spring Bank Holiday Saturday before August Bank Holiday Christmas Day Boxing Day New Years Eve 9 Days

First pay day Saturdays for January – December 12 Days

St Patricks Saturday Halloween Saturday Valentines Saturday 3 Days

Applejax has operated as a nightclub within Chorley for many years. It has been largely dormant since the latter part of 2018. The recent history is that in September 2019 the ownership passed from Mr Peter Verhaege to Myst Leisure Ltd with a new proposed DPS Mr Darren Ofsarnie. Myst Ltd did not trade the club and it became apparent that Myst Ltd. had pulled out of the premises leaving a number of debts. It has subsequently operated via a number of TENs through to 6am during the Christmas and New Year period of 2018 where the applicant was Mr. Asim GULZAR.

10pm 15/12/2018 – 6am 16/12/2018 10pm 21/12/2018 – 6am 27/12/2018 10pm 29/12/2018 – 6am 01/01/2019

These were not objected to by police and followed consultation between the event organisers and Lancashire Police. They fell within the Christmas / New Year period when police resources had already been diverted to work extended hours to police the night time economy throughout Lancashire. They represented an opportunity for the venue to make some revenue after an extended period of closure. It is not unusual for premises to seek extended hours around Christmas and New Year festivities and it is normal for police not to have objections as it is something we prepare for and specially resource with increased number of officers on patrol during the night time. In relation to the extended opening hours TENs for AppleJax over Christmas and the New Year, they did not pass without incident. There were three incidents as follows :

23/12/2018 Early hours Male member of staff Charlie WINYARD assaulted by customer requiring butterfly stitches to eye at hospital.

25/12/2018 04:03 hrs MALE ARRESTED OUTSIDE DRUNK AND DISORDERLY HAVING BEEN EJECTED BY STAFF.

30/12/2018 04:03 hrs Call from AppleJax to police "2 MALES FIGHTING WE HAVE SPLIT THEM UP BUT THEY ARE VERY AGGRESSIVE . NO ONE INJURED . NO WEAPONS . ONE MALE 18 YRS OLD ONE MALE 30 YRS . THEY ARE BOTH REFUSING TO MOVE ON. WE NEED THE POLICE HERE TO ASSIST"

All three are of concern but I note that the call to Police on 30th December 2018 indicated that things had escalated at the premises to the point where they needed police assistance and the incident on 23rd December 2018 indicated that there was sufficient violence at the venue that a member of staff was hospitalised.

Without casting any aspersions on the current management, a review of police systems back to January 2016 shows a steady level of incidents around violence, drugs, drunkenness and nuisance directly associated with Applejax operating until 4am.

On 17th January 2019 the premises licence was transferred to VAL PUBS Ltd which currently has a sole director Mr Asim GULZAR and it is Mr. GULZAR who is currently the DPS.

Further TEN applications seeking to run AppleJax until 6am on various dates in February and March were received .

They were withdrawn after Police objection leaving the club free to run on its original licence until 4am

The current application has the potential to create a premises within Chorley where customers can drink uninterrupted for 13 hours.

The current premises licence PLA0281 contains conditions from 5th December 2018 The current licence conditions refer to opening and sale of alcohol as follows Sale of alcohol – Sunday to Wednesday 20:00 - 0100 Thursday to Saturday 20:00 - 03:30 Bank Holiday Sunday, Christmas Eve, Boxing Day and New Years Eve 20.00 - 03.30 Opening Hours Sunday to Wednesday 20:00-01:30 Thursday to Saturday 20:00-04:00 Bank Holiday Sunday, Christmas Eve, Boxing Day & New Years Eve 20.00 - 04.00 These were also the hours in the previous licence.

What has already been suggested by the police is a reasonable compromise, allowing Applejax to offer extended hours of drinking on days when there will be a public appetite for it and when there is likely to be sufficient additional police resources available to deal with the inevitable consequences.

The police representation is that extending drinking hours at Applejax until 6am on every Friday and Saturday will have a serious impact on the licencing objectives in terms of crime, disorder, nuisance and public safety whilst their adoption of the police proposal would allow them to serve a customer demand for later drinking in circumstances that will allow for the impact to be managed without an unacceptable impact on the licensing objectives.
