BACKGROUND OF THE PREMISES

- 8. The premises has been licensed since the coming into force of the Licensing Act in 2005, with a brief break in 2019. The most recent premises licence was granted on 1st May 2019. The licence was transferred into the name of the current premises licence holder on 17th December 2019.
- 9. The current premises licence, which is appended at Appendix 1, authorises the sale of alcohol between the following hours:

Day	Authorised Hours
Monday- Friday	07:00-21:00hrs
Saturday- Sunday	08:00- 21:00hrs

with corresponding opening hours.

- 10. Members will note the existing conditions which are imposed at Annex 2 of the premises licence.
- 11. A location plan of the immediate surrounding area is appended at Appendix 2.

THE APPLICATION

- 12. On 18th August 2020, an application to vary the premises licence was received, a copy of which is appended at Appendix 3. The application was advertised in accordance with Regulation 25 of The Licensing Act 2003 (Premises licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005. This application seeks to extend the permitted hours for the sale of alcohol as follows:

Day	Authorised Hours
Monday- Sunday	08:00-22:00

with hours the premises is open to the public from 07:00hrs each day.

- 13. The applicant is not seeking to remove any conditions currently imposed on the licence and offers a number of steps intended to promote the objectives within Section 16 of the application.

A number of complaints have been made regarding the use of the premises outside of permitted hours. On every occasion these complaints have been made, an investigation has been conducted, to include review of the premises' CCTV systems, and has been unable to gather any evidence which corroborates the complaints made. It shall be for the Committee to decide, based on the available evidence, the truth of the allegations.



ANNEX 1 – MANDATORY CONDITIONS

MANDATORY DRINKS CODE

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence; or (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

ALCOHOL PROMOTIONS

(1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

(2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises.

(a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to -
(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
(ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);

(b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective ;

(c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;

(d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner

DISPENSING ALCOHOL

(e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

FREE TAP WATER

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

AGE VERIFICATION

- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.

ALCOHOL MEASURES

The responsible person shall ensure that-

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-
 - (i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

EXHIBITION OF FILMS

- 1a) The Premises licence holder shall ensure that the admission of children to the exhibition of any film shall be restricted in accordance with section 20 of the Licensing Act 2003(the Act)
- 1b) Unless section 20(3) (b) of the Act applies, admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the film classification board specified in this licence
- 1c) Where section 20(3) (b) of the Act applies, admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the licensing authority
- 1d) Where no film classification board is specified in this licence admission of children to the exhibition of any film shall be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by the licensing authority.
- 1e) For the purposes of this condition:-

"children" means persons aged under 18; and

"film classification board" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984
(authority to determine suitability of video works for classification)

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DOOR SUPERVISORS

The Premises licence holder shall ensure that each individual present on the premises to carry out a security activity [as defined by paragraph 2(1) (a) of the Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001] must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

SCHEDULE Mandatory Licensing Condition

MINIMUM DRINKS PRICING

1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1-

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(1); .

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula- .

where-

(i) P is the permitted price,

(ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

(iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence

(i) the holder of the premises licence,

(ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or

(iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(2).

3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

ANNEX 2 – CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

1. The premises shall operate and maintain a CCTV system which shall be in use during all times licensable activities are taking place at the premises and comply as follows:
 - a) The system shall cover all entrances and exits from the premises, in addition to covering all internal areas of the premises used to display/supply licensed products
 - b) The focus of the camera(s) shall be so as to enable clear identification of persons on the premises.
 - c) The system will be capable of time and date stamping recordings and retaining said recordings for at least 28 days.
 - d) The Data Controller shall make footage available to a Police Officer or authorised officer, where such a request is made in accordance with the principles of the Data Protection Act or any subsequent or alternative legislation.
 - e) Signage advising that CCTV is in operation.
2. A documented Challenge 25 scheme will be operated at the premises. The Challenge 25 scheme will be actively promoted and advertised at the premises and any person purchasing alcohol, who appears to be under 25 years of age, shall be asked to provide acceptable identification to prove that they are 18 years of age or over. Failure to supply such identification will result in no sale or supply of alcohol to that person. The Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS) will be actively promoted at the premises by the display of Challenge 25 posters bearing the PASS logo. A PASS accredited holographic proof of age card will be the main identification document accepted at the premises as proof of age. A PASS card must be accepted as proof of age if a purchaser possesses one. Where a purchaser does not possess a PASS accredited proof of age card, only the following alternative forms of identification will be acceptable:
 - (a) Photo Driving Licence
 - (b) Passport or
 - (c) Her Majesty's Forces Warrant Card
 - (d) National including EU Identity Cards
3. A documented training scheme shall be introduced for all staff in a position to sell alcohol. The scheme shall be made available for inspection at the request of any Police Officer, Trading Standards Officer or Local Authority Enforcement Officer.

The Designated Premises Supervisor of Premises Licence Holder shall conduct six monthly training reviews with all members of staff authorised to sell, serve or deliver alcohol in order to reinforce the training and to promote best practice. The written record shall be kept of the content of such reviews and be available for inspection by any responsible authority upon request.
4. The premises licence holder shall require the designated premises supervisor, or in his/her absence other responsible person, to keep an Incident/Refusals Register in which full details of all incidents are recorded. This shall include details of any refused sales and shall give details of the persons involved, incident description, time and date, actions taken and final outcome of the situation. This shall be completed as soon as possible and in any case no later than the close of business on the day of the incident. The time and date when the report was completed, and by whom, is to form part of the entry. The register is to be kept on the premises at all times and shall be available for inspection by any responsible authority upon request.





This is an objection letter to the above mentioned licence/ opening hours extension application and call for the council to refuse it.

I am a resident of the adjacent road to this business and although I benefit from the convenience of this shop the extension to the open hours does concern me and my family, particularly the late night aspect.

In line with the licencing laws I would like to raise the following points:

The Protection of Children from Harm:

I am a mum to two small children (8 years old and 4 years old) who both sleep in the front of the house (opposite the shop). We already cannot open their windows at night due to the noise associated with the shop eg the extraction canopy which is located on the side of the building; I assume this is from their refrigeration unit to cool the alcohol. If the shop is open until 10pm this will elongate this noise nuisance.

~~Early on in the morning the extraction fan that will be in use in our street they will be the shop and the increased amount of people that will be in the area late at night. All this noise and the amount of people that will be in the area late at night will impact on their sleep, particularly on school days.~~

Prevention of Public Nuisance:

Currently during the day there is an increase in people drinking beer and people in cars visiting the shop causing noise nuisance. I am very concerned this will extend late at night and to open for longer hours, putting my children to sleep. Cars regularly park in front of the shop and the noise from residents trying to park on the street they live on. I have to park on a nearby road and then move my car after the shop has closed. The poor parking often leads to cars having being used and conversations being held in the street, which can get loud. This is not something that my partner or my children would appreciate late at night outside our house.

Litter is another concern us as residents of this area, which again will increase with the shop opening for longer. We often wake to empty beer bottles and cans on our window sills/ garden walls and outside our front doors. ~~It is also a concern that there will be an increase in public toilets in the area as people purchase additional alcohol later in the evening. This is where any child may play.~~

Prevention of Crime - Burglaries:

On a daily occurrence there is a drug trade happening at the area at the back of the shop (the police are aware of this situation). I do not think it is linked to the shop but the shop being open does provide people with a reason to be in the area. I feel the longer opening hours would contribute to an increase in the drug dealing which is already a great concern to me and my family.

Overall I believe this shop provides a great service during the day but opening until 10pm would only bring more issues to our residential area. ~~It is a 10 minute walk to a 24 hours Asda store. There is no way we could get to work required late at night. We believe the extra costs associated with the extended hours will greatly out way any benefits.~~
