6. Clarification on rumours that shop mobility is possibly having to close was requested

Shop Mobility has received core funding for 2009/10. The Director of People and Places, Jamie Carson, has contacted Maurice Waterhouse at Shop Mobility to get an update on their funding position and what that means for the shop in 2010 as well as to provide him with details on the process for applying for funding for next year to support them to continue to provide their valuable service.

8. A query was raised about the gap in play provision for six year olds at Astley Park.

In the new play area at Astley Park the Council has catered for the widest range of ages possible given the budget available.

Each piece of equipment caters for specific abilities. The play area is meant to be challenging and encourages calculated risk. While the larger modular unit says "eight years onwards" in its brochure, it is not to say that younger children cannot safely be accommodated.

More traditional equipment/features expected on play areas are considered dated in modern play design, and as a result, have pushed a generation of young people away from play spaces to take their risks in less appropriate venues - canals, train lines, busy roads etc.

It is the Council's intention to stimulate young minds and offer both physical and mental obstacles. The Council is confident that we have done that - and delivered excellent value for money at the same time.

In time the Council would look to expand our provision and this mid-range age group will be a target.

9. Councillor Iris Smith asked if the Council had considered implementing extended disabled car parking space to better enable wheel chair users to get out of their vehicle.

The current number of disabled parking places was deemed to be sufficient at this time, and there are no

plans to develop any extended car parking space. This will be continually reviewed and the format of car parks will be reviewed if necessary.

10. A list of accessible meeting venues was requested

The Council is in the process of collating a list of accessible meeting venues. We also have a meeting venue checklist which we ask staff to complete when choosing a venue to ensure that is accessible. Copies of the checklist will be available at the next meeting.

11. Diane Gradwell offered to provide further information on the Citizens Advice Bureau – CABability Project

Details of the CABability project which brings together a number of services from different organisations for people who are housebound and cannot access the services in any other way will be available at the next meeting.

12. Francis Maguire raised a query on allotments.

A report will be circulated or a sort presentation will be given at the next meeting.
