

Town Centre Accessibility

Equality Forum Task and Finish Group

Introduction

This report provides the findings from the Town Centre Accessibility Review. This was undertaken during the winter / spring of 2009/10 by a group of partners. The review has identified a number of actions, which together will enable us to make Chorley Town Centre a more accessible place to visit for everyone.

Process for the Review

The Equality Forum set up a task and finish group to undertake a review of town centre accessibility. The task and finish group included;

- Chorley Council, representation from;
 - o Planning, Urban Design and Policy
 - o Policy, Equalities
 - o Streetscene
 - o Town Centre Management
- · Lancashire County Council, Highways
- · Lancashire County Council, District Partnership Office
- Chorley and South Ribble Disability Forum

The task and finish group undertook a number of town centre walkabouts, to identify potential accessibility issues for people with both visual and physical disabilities. The group then worked together to identify solutions for these issues. This was drawn together into an action plan, which indentified the issues, the solutions, the lead officers and organisations and a timescale for implementation of the solutions.

The action plan will be implemented from 1st May 2010, and will be measured by Chorley Council's Performance, Partnerships and Equalities Manager on behalf of the Equality Forum. The actions within it range from six weeks to more long term actions, dependant on other developments within the town centre. As a guide, where a specific date is not indicated, the following guideline applies; Short term - up to 6 months, Medium term - 6 months to one year, Long term - one year plus.

To conclude, a note of thanks to all those involved in this review for both their time and commitment to making Chorley Town Centre a more accessible place to visit for all.
