OBJECTION TO TREE PRESERVATION ORDER NO. 2 (WHITTLE-LE-WOODS) 2007

PURPOSE OF REPORT

1. The purpose of this report is to decide whether to confirm the above Tree Preservation Order (TPO) in light of the objection received.

RECOMMENDATION(S)

2. That Tree Preservation Order No 2 (Whittle le Woods) 2007 be confirmed subject to the one modification, namely that the following tree T9 (Sycamore) be removed from the Order.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION(S)

(If the recommendations are accepted)

- 3. The objection to protection of the Sycamore (T9) is noted. As this tree sits within the middle rather than on the edge of the group it is considered that not confirming the TPO on this tree will not have a detrimental impact on the visual amenity of the area if the tree were to be felled.
- 4. With regard to the objection to the Sweet Chestnut trees in relation to the danger caused by falling fruit it is considered that the trees are of sufficient distance from the property to warrant their continued protection, as collectively the trees provide a valuable and significant contribution to the visual amenity of the area.

BACKGROUND

- 6. An outline planning application had been received for a single dwelling in the grounds of Mount Villa. Although a Tree Preservation Order was made in 1972 by Chorley Rural District Council, the status of this Order was in doubt and in light of the significant changes that have taken place since 1972 it was considered expedient to place a new TPO on the trees.
- 7. A tree preservation order was placed on a group of nine trees located within the grounds of Mount Villa, 228 Whittle-le-Woods, Chorley. The removal of the trees would have a significant impact on the environment and its enjoyment by the public.
- 8. A letter of objection has been received from the owners of Mount Villa on the grounds that T9 (a Sycamore) should not be protected due to maintenance requirements and the perceived lower intrinsic value of this species. The occupants also object to the Order placed on four Sweet Chestnut trees (T4, T5, T7 and T8) due to the danger posed by falling fruit.
- 9. It is recommended that the Tree Preservation Order (T.P.O. Number 2) be modified to so that the Order is not confirmed in relation to the Sycamore (T9) in line with objections made by the owners. However, it is recommended that it be confirmed on the Sweet Chestnut trees T4, T5, T7 and T8.
